

What a Character!


The students in Ms. Lagasse's class are thinking of someone special in their life, and coming up with three character traits (adjectives) to describe that person.

First, to come up with a character trait, they think about some of the special things that person has done and ask themselves, "What kind of person would do that?"



Some of the character traits we have come up with are: caring, friendly, compassionate, kind, helpful, wise, generous (giving), responsible, calm, determined, fun, intelligent, and brave. We are categorizing the things our special person has done into evidence for three different character traits.

Next, we organize our character trait categories and supporting evidence on a 4-Square, and then use the 4-Square to help us write a 5-paragraph Friendly Letter to this special person.



How do we turn the 4-Square into a 5-Paragraph paper?

- 1. The center box: First paragraph (This introduces the topic/main idea. It tells us what the whole paper will be about. For now, we are letting this just be one sentence.)
- 2. The top left square: Second paragraph
- 3. The top right square: Third paragraph
- 4. The bottom left square: Fourth paragraph
- The middle paragraphs tell us about 3 different details of the main idea/topic introduced in the first paragraph. If you look at the first sentence of each of these paragraphs, it will tell you what detail that whole paragraph will be about.
- 5. The bottom right square: Last paragraph (This is our conclusion. It does not give us any new information. It is one sentence that mentions the main idea (from the center box), and lists the 3 detail categories (the words that are in the boxes of the other 3 squares). For now, we are letting this just be one sentence.) Our example is on back \rightarrow
